Planting of Trees in An Urban Setting

The St. Joseph County Soil and Water Conservation District, in cooperation with the South Bend Parks and Recreation Department and the South Bend Audubon Society, have coordinated their efforts in helping to sponsor an urban reforestation project in the Rum Village Neighborhood this past April. Funding was made possible through a state grant the District received to assist with the project, which provided the purchase of city street trees, approximately 1 1/2 to 2" caliper, to be planted in a homeowner's front yard. A tree planting workshop was held at Rum Village on April 26th for those landowners who requested a tree.

In addition, a tree planting ceremony was held at Walker Field, where a sweet gum tree was planted to kick off the project. Elementary students and parents from Our Lady of Hungary assisted with the tree planting in conjunction with Arbor Day. A total of fifteen homeowners requested the trees, which were delivered by the South Bend Parks and Recreation Department.


