No-Mow May the Right way!

Many of us have heard of the trend "No-Mow May". While it may sound like a good thing at first, many wildlife habitat experts think that it really depends. "No-Mow May" started in Europe with the goal to raise awareness of bees and other early pollinators and the need for early season pollen and nectar producing plants. Refraining from mowing at that time



period (in Europe) allowed more lawn weeds to go to flower and provide some of the needed food for these early pollinators. Again, while this initially seems like a good idea, there can be issues. If your lawn doesn't have many dandelions or clover in it to begin with, you may just end up with long, thick turf grass which doesn't provide the quantity or quality of resources needed for the pollinators. Many cities and counties have ordinances in place that don't allow certain types of vegetation to get too tall. Letting the lawn grow may put you at odds with code enforcement and risk of getting a fine (or at risk of upsetting your neighbors)! If you create this early habitat and then mow after May, you risk physical harm to any pollinators or other wildlife that thought they had a safe place to nest. These are just a few potential negative impacts.

So, what can you do to help provide for these early pollinators? Many early pollinators actually get their food from trees so planting or maintaining trees will provide benefits all year long! You can mow high to allow the clover and dandelion to bloom but not let the turf grass become an overgrown issue. You can also replace some of the grass area that you



mow with some native habitat. Planting some early blooming natives will give those bees and pollinators some quality food and a safe place to nest.

Planning your planting to have flowers blooming throughout the growing season will provide resources for an even wider variety of wildlife.
