From Waste to Rescue

Did you know that 30 to 40% of food in the US is wasted? That's about \$165 billion of food wasted each year! The EPA estimates that more food was sent to landfills than any other single material in 2018. Decomposing food and other organic materials produce large amounts of methane and carbon dioxide, making significant contributions to climate change. Food waste is also a waste of our natural resources, taking a lot of water and energy to produce and transport.

In our May/June newsletter, we had an article about steps our local landfill is taking to reduce emissions by converting methane emissions into renewable natural gas. This issue, we wanted to highlight programs that are making an impact before the food makes it to the landfill.



Composting is an activity that can have a major impact on decreasing the amount of food entering the landfill, and two of our universities, St. Mary's and IUSB, are doing just that. IUSB's Center for a Sustainable Future has in the past placed buckets around the dorms to collect food scraps, which they would then take to composting tumblers. They are looking to build the program, making it campus wide. St. Mary's College collects food scraps from the dining hall to compost

and use in their sustainable garden - compost is an excellent soil additive! Notre Dame, on the other hand, uses a program called Grind2Energy. This takes all of the inedible food waste and converts it into clean water and renewable energy.

Of course, not all uneaten food is inedible. There is a lot of edible food wasted, but luckily there are programs that divert this food to feed people that need it. St. Mary's group works with campus dining to package excess food and deliver it to the Center for the Homeless. Notre Dame sends food from events and dining halls to Cultivate Food Rescue. This is an organization who 'rescues' food from many sources, like Notre Dame, grocery stores, farms, and caterers. They organize and prepare the food, then distribute it to feed many food-insecure families in northern Indiana.

We can make an impact on how much food is wasted in our own homes, too. A good first step would be to watch how much food you throw away. Are you buying more than you really need? Or more than you can use before it spoils?

And, of course, we can all be composting! There are many methods and setups available, so there is something for everyone, even people in an apartment! And compost makes a huge impact on your soil health.

run increases yield for your crops.




Have you seen our signs? Throughout the county, we are placing signs near farms that are using cover crops. Our goal is to educate the public on how *everyone* benefits from

Wrangling the Invasives!

The St. Joseph-Marshall Counties Invasive Plant Partnership (SMIPP) held the last Weed Wrangle of the year in October. It was a chilly and rainy day, but we had good attendance and got a lot of invasives removed! Invasive species are non-native organisms that

spread aggressively and disrupt the ecosystem. They pose a threat to native plants and wildlife.

SMIPP is here to provide information and resources to the community and to build and improve control efforts. We hold Weed Wrangles in the spring and fall in public spaces for hands-on removal of invasive species. We also host Invasives Walk and Talks through the year to educate about identification and removal methods, and to give the public a chance to talk directly with professionals. And 2024 is going to bring


