# Weathering the Changes

Adjustments in farm management are normal. Farmers have always had seasons where they have to adapt to new pests, or weather events, or market conditions. While weather is a common variable, the changes we have seen in the past few years have been more significant.

Temperature Increases: average temperatures have increased over 1.5 degrees since 1900, with the greatest acceleration in the past couple of



decades. While this may not seem like a huge change, it has lengthened our growing season, and temperatures are still increasing.

- **Precipitation Changes:** we are seeing heavier, more intense rainfall events, • which have a great impact on runoff, erosion and infrastructure. The expectations are that we will have an increase in winter and spring precipitation by about 10 to 20%.
- Soil Moisture and Drought Stress: we are facing warmer conditions, longer growing seasons, and longer stretches between rainfalls. Plus the intense rainfalls just mentioned may mean more runoff, decreasing soil moisture and increasing drought stress.

This year we have seen significant, intense rainfall events in some areas, while others had nothing, and that was followed by drought conditions. Unfortunately it looks like these changes are here to stay.

### **Conservation Plans**

Fortunately our cropland has the ability to adapt to these changes with the right planning. Increasing diversity through natural ecosystems and agricultural management practices, utilizing practices that reduce the impact of extreme rainfall, and focusing on building soil health all contribute to the



resiliency of a farm.

# **Check the List Before You Grow!**

Our clients are often excited to get their habitat growing, but before purchasing and planting seed, double check that mix! Like a carefully crafted recipe, each component of the mix is included for a specific purpose. The seed mix developed for you is based on your target habitat, your location, and your site conditions, as well as any program requirements.

Some things to note about the seed mixes:

- Do you have a list of approved species and quantities?
- A big list doesn't necessarily mean a big price tag.
- All mixes developed by USDA are listed in Pure Live Seed.
- Substitutions happen since availability varies.
- If you have a prepared mix you'd rather use, be sure to check that it will meet requirements!

Before you put the seed in the ground, make sure it matches your original list, or double check any changes with NRCS. Remember: unapproved mixes can prevent or delay payment.

With the proper mix, your results will bloom!
