City residents of South Bend and Mishawaka have curb side pick up on designated dates.

If you live outside of the city, **Organic Resources** in South Bend will accept Christmas trees to their recycling facility for a fee of \$3.65.

Or consider composting the tree yourself. You can cut it into smaller pieces and add it to your compost pile or stand it up in your backyard to create some attractive bird habitat. You can even decorate it with orange slices, nuts and bird suet to create an organic bird feeder!

With the holidays over, the wrapping paper recycled, excess canned goods donated to the food bank, and the Christmas tree composted, we are all ready to get the New Year off to a green start. But with all of the new gifts and gadgets



we just unwrapped we have to get rid of the old to make room for the new.

Old clothes and toys can be donated to local thrift shops and donation centers but what about that old cell phone, TV or laptop?

E-cycle it! These electronics contain many different components- some reusable and some toxic. They need to be handled and processed carefully to protect our health and environment. Please keep these items out of the landfill by recycling them at the proper locations. Radon Testing in your Home.

January is National Radon Action Month.

Radon is a cancer-causing, radioactive gas that can be found all over the United States. Radon comes from the natural radioactive breakdown of uranium in soil, rock and water and gets into the air we breathe. According to the EPA, radon tends to accumulate in enclosed structures, so it is particularly a problem in homes. The Surgeon General has warned that radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer in the United States today.

As we close the doors and windows for the winter to seal out the cold, we also seal in any existing radon, potentially increasing our exposure. According to the Indiana Department of Environmental Management, close to 1 in 4 homes tested in Indiana found elevated radon levels. On the map, the darker counties are expected to have the highest average radon levels. The lighter counties are expected to have medium average radon levels. **No counties in Indiana are expected to be in the low zone.**



Consider testing your home for radon and find out how to reduce your exposure. There are two basic options: purchase a radon home test kit from a local hardware store and follow the directions, or call a certified lab to purchase a test kit and follow the directions. The Indiana State Department of Health maintains a list of Indiana Certified Laboratories (317/351-7194). You can also contact the Indiana Department of Environmental Management Radon Hotline (800-272-9723) or your local Health Department (574/235-9750).

How to Make a HEALTHY HABITAT In Your Backyard

SHELTER—This is where wildlife will sleep at night and raise their babies.

Plant shrubs and conifer trees.

Most of our bird life prefer to build their nests is thick shrubs and conifers. A nice, lush spruce tree for sleeping on a cold winter night is an excellent choice.

Build a bird house.

Use different sized holes for different species and in the winter don't be surprised to see a mouse using it for its home. Remember these do not have to be fancy—an old coffee container can make a great bird house.

WATER— Everyone likes a good, cool drink of water.

Put out a bird bath.

Again it does not have to be fancy, and there are many options: A garbage pail lid turned upside down and placed on the ground will work just fine. Add a heating coil to it and keep it going all winter. You will be amazed at all the animals that will use it. Check out your local feed store and garden shops for other options.

Build a small garden pond.

Again check out your local lawn and garden store for a variety of sizes and prices. Don't forget the pump and keep it going all winter, the animals will love you.

FOOD — This can be done in a variety of ways.

Plant something they like.

With a little research you can find just the right plant for your yard and your critters. For example, a Dogwood tree has beautiful nectar laden flowers and berries that are fed on by over 40 species of birds.

Bird feeder, anyone?

Remember everyone likes something different. Low cost bird food is ok, but will attract a lot of sparrows. Food with more sunflower, red proso millet and white proso millet will attract a wider variety of bird life. Again your bird feeder can be as elaborate or simple as you like, store bought or made at home.

♦ NRCS 2008 Farm Bill and Water Quality

AWEP (Agricultural Water Enhancement Program) is a component of the **2008 Farm Bill** program, **EQIP** (Environmental Quality Incentives Program), which is administered by **USDA-NRCS**. For Indiana, **AWEP** is targeted to producers in two approved AWEP project areas:

- St. Joseph River watershed that drains west/northwest into Lake Michigan. Seven northern Indiana counties have agricultural land in the St. Joseph watershed: **St. Joseph**, Elkhart, LaGrange, Steuben, Kosciusko, Noble and Dekalb.
- LaPorte County in the Kankakee River watershed

AWEP promotes ground and surface water conservation and improves water quality.

It is a voluntary conservation initiative that provides financial and technical assistance to agricultural producers to implement agricultural water enhancement activities on agricultural land for the purposes of conserving surface and ground water and improving water quality.

Agricultural producers in selected project areas may apply for available **AWEP** funds at their local USDA Service Center. Once an application is selected, an eligible agricultural producer will enter into a contract with NRCS to implement approved conservation practices. Through these **EQIP** program contracts, NRCS provides payments to agricultural producers for implementing conservation practices.

NRCS Announces Strong Interest in New Conservation Stewardship Program and Second Round of Sign-Ups

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7, 2009— NRCS Chief Dave White announced that NRCS received 21,300 applications to participate in the new **Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP)**. These applications cover an estimated 33 million acres, nationwide.

"NRCS has received enough applications to carry out conservation activities on more than twice the number of acres Congress authorized for CSP this year," White said. "This incredible response shows that conservation-minded producers and landowners want to attain higher levels of conservation stewardship." Congress capped the annual acreage enrollment nationally at 12,769,000 for each fiscal year. The final national and state-by-state numbers on acreage nationwide will be available in the near future.

CSP provides financial and technical assistance to eligible agricultural and forestry producers to conserve and enhance soil, water, air and related natural resources on their land, and encourages producers to voluntarily implement more conservation practices and improve, maintain and manage existing ones. Lands accepted into CSP include cropland, pastureland, rangeland and non-industrial private forest land — a new land use for the program — and agricultural land under the jurisdiction of an Indian tribe. Individual landowners/operators, legal entities, corporations and Indian tribes are eligible to apply for CSP assistance.

Those who are not approved for funding through this first sign-up will have the option to participate in the second sign-up period, which will be held from Oct. 1 through January 2010. SAFETY MEETS CONSERVATION — **Safe Sidewalks** — When deicing use salt sparingly. Any salt we put down on roads or sidewalks will eventually end up in our waterways. Too much salt can be toxic for fish and other wildlife. Start by clearing your sidewalks with a snow blower or snow shovel and a good dose of elbow grease. (Think of it as a great way to work off those holiday cookies). Then add salt **sparingly!** Follow the application rates supplied on the package- they were developed to protect our health and environment.
